

SEVENTH AMENDMENT TO PROFESSIONAL SERVICES CONTRACT

This Seventh Amendment to the Professional Services Contract (hereinafter “Amendment 7”) is made and entered into this 21st day of May, 2025, by and between Crook County, a political subdivision of the State of Oregon (hereinafter “County”) and PBS Engineering and Environmental, LLC, as successor in interest to PBS Engineering and Environmental, Inc. (hereinafter “Contractor”), collectively the “Parties.”

RECITALS

- A. County and Contractor are parties to a Professional Services Contract dated May 16, 2018, as amended, for services including environmental monitoring for the Crook County Landfill (hereinafter the “Contract”).
- B. County’s environmental monitoring needs are ongoing. The Parties wish to update the Contract to reflect the current requested scope of services and adjust the fee schedule.
- C. PBS Engineering and Environmental, Inc., a Delaware corporation with principal place of business of Portland, Oregon, as an original party to the Contract, has assigned all its rights and responsibilities under that Contract to PBS Engineering and Environmental, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company with principal place of business of 2101 Gaither Road, Suite 500, Rockville, MD 20850.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. Costs for Services. The fees contained in the Contract, as previously amended, are replaced with the fees described in the attached Exhibit A, which will replace the fees described on the Contract’s Exhibit D upon the effective date of this Amendment 7.
- 2. Reaffirmation. Except as modified by this Amendment 7, all terms and conditions of the Contract and any prior amendments are reaffirmed and remain unmodified and in full force and effect.
- 3. Substitution of Contractor. Upon the Effective Date of this Amendment 7, County accepts and acknowledges the substitution of PBS Engineering and Environmental, LLC, in place of PBS Engineering and Environmental, Inc., as the “Contractor” as that term is used in the Contract.

4. Counterparts. This Amendment 7 may be executed in one or more counterparts, including electronically transmitted counterparts, which when taken together shall constitute one in the same instrument. Facsimiles and electronic transmittals of the signed document shall be binding as though they were an original of such signed document.

Request for a Sixth Amendment to Extend the Existing Professional Services Contract

PBS is providing Crook County with our 2025 annual budget for the continuation of landfill monitoring services completed under the existing Professional Services Contract dated 5/16/18. The scope of services is consistent with the 2024 groundwater and leachate sampling and analysis, landfill gas quarterly monitoring, and surface emission monitoring (conducted on a quarterly basis), greenhouse gas reporting, and includes all subsequent reporting requirements. The proposed 2025 monitoring budget excludes the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) split sample event as these activities are not required for 2025.

The Proposed Cost Estimate for the Crook County Landfill Environmental Professional Services Contract, see Exhibit A, was prepared using updated 2025 labor and laboratory rates. The budget has increased by 5% year over year and is mostly related to PBS labor rates and laboratory fee adjustments.

Given the retirement of Toby Scott in January 2025, Tom Mergy will lead our project team and be your point of contact. The PBS team still consists of long-term staff Kyle Johnson and Holly Burnett who have worked on the Crook County landfill for the past several years. Tom Mergy, Senior Geologist, will provide technical review and quality assurance/quality control for the landfill groundwater and SEM monitoring data and report deliverables.

We look forward to supporting Crook County with these professional landfill environmental monitoring services through 2025.
