2025 FCH Changes:

Crook County Sustainable Food Solutions

In 2025, CCSFS coalition work has also grown to include over 45 community organizations, strengthening collaboration and expanding the reach of its efforts to serve Crook County. CCSFS partnered with Pioneer High School to establish a food pantry in 2025, organized food relief for the Paulina area during wildfires, assisted with the Point in Time Count for Crook County, and is preparing to engage in the upcoming Nutrition Oregon Campaign.

2025-27 Biennial Budget Reduction Impacts

In response to the recent economic forecast, state agencies — including the Higher Education Coordinating Commission (HECC) — were asked to provide potential budget reductions to the Governor and Legislature. HECC's proposed reductions include the OSU Statewides (OSU Extension, Ag Experiment Station, Forest Research Lab), Outdoor School, state programs and general funding for public universities. This information will be used to inform the Governor and Legislature in preparation for budget reduction discussions during the 2026 Legislative Session.

Potential reduction and impacts

HECC has proposed a 5.85% reduction (approximately \$11.5 million biennially) for the OSU Statewides. This amount is not final. These programs are essential to Oregon's rural communities and natural resource industries. Budget cuts would disproportionately affect these areas, limit economic growth and reduce support for farms, forests, fisheries, youth and families.

Cuts of this magnitude could lead to closure of a research facility, loss of approximately 40 positions and reductions in services and programming. Hiring freezes are already in effect for some state-funded positions, and further decisions will follow the 2026 legislative session.

Challenges

- State funding remains a significant and vital part of our budgets. Reductions will put pressure on our longstanding cooperative state-federal-local/county funding partnerships.
- The original 2025–27 state budget allocation for the OSU Statewides did not fully fund continued service levels, which has already impacted OSU's ability to fill critical positions.
- Federal research funding is declining, adding pressure to already strained budgets.
- Counties, which contribute 20% of Extension funding, rely on stable state support to maintain services.

Preserve Oregon's investment

We recognize that the state's current financial situation will require budget adjustments. However, **the OSU Statewides should not and cannot take a disproportional cut**.

The OSU Statewides are deeply rooted in every Oregon county, providing integrated research, education and outreach that support:

- Thriving agricultural and food systems
- Sustainable natural resource management
- Healthy communities and families
- Youth development through programs like 4-H

Now more than ever, it is important for elected officials to hear from residents about the impact and value of the OSU Statewides in their community.

OSU EXTENSION MASTER GARDENER IMPACTS 2024

CENTRAL OREGON

Crook, Deschutes & Jefferson Counties

Our Local Need: Central Oregon is consistently the fastest growing region in the state with many newcomers from other areas of the country and different growing environments. All three counties are experiencing significant growth with an increased demand for gardening information specific to the high desert and related to growing local food.

Program Highlights: We successfully operated two community gardens ensuring **food security** in our community and donated 814 lbs. of food to Neighbor Impact. We **taught 21 classes** in the region via in person and on zoom specific to growing local food. We hosted 4 mobile plant clinics at community events. This year at Alpenglow Demonstration Garden we installed a **Native American** food and flower crop area in the cultural garden, including a currant and wild strawberries. We participated in a **Crook County on the Move** event, a local partner that inspires healthy living for underserved populations. We provided technical gardening support for the Steins Pillar Elementary school garden in Prineville. This year the **29th Annual High Desert Garden Tour** featured five sites in Crook County and had **305 attendees plus staff and volunteers**. Sites featured a wide array of gardening styles from firewise landscapes to large scale vegetable production. Master Gardener volunteers answered 496 questions to date in our two plant clinics, at events and through AskExtension an online portal. We have 1140 clients receiving **Project** Happy Apples information to reduce codling moth populations and 1106 subscribers receiving the High Desert Gardening newsletter. All of these efforts have led to an increase in knowledge in all areas of food production and integrated pest management.
